

## **KINDNESS MATTERS**



Weekly, VPI's Kindness Matters program supports early morning outreach walks through the streets of Tampa, where those experiencing homelessness are found in parks and on benches. By stopping, sharing stories, and names with those encountered, identity is given to people often not seen. Once a month, carts are taken which supply food, coffee, books, glasses, clothing, blankets, toiletries and other needed items. Every week, local supermarket gift cards are given to promote autonomy and independence. By seeing the invisible, we often see ourselves more clearly.
